

## TWU NATIONAL COUNCIL: MEMBER UPDATE May 2025

At this year's TWU National Council held in Brisbane, TWU members and elected officials set three main resolutions for our union's next big fights.



To continue building towards our 2026 fight—our biggest campaign ever as a union to set better standards across road transport and aviation.



To lobby for a Safe and Secure Skies Commission in aviation to ensure workers and the community are put first, and hold companies like Swissport accountable for dragging industry standards down.



Developing our Future of Work Claim and to ensure that consultation with transport workers is put front and centre on decisions related to AI, automation and transition to net zero.





In 2026, over 200 enterprise agreements covering hundreds and thousands of transport workers across road and aviation will expire together, **giving us huge power to lift standards across the industry**.

## KEY STATS FROM TWU'S SURVEY OF OVER 2000 AVIATION WORKERS

87% have been rushed or pressured to work unsafely

92% want to stay in aviation but



have been injured at work

75% say they can't continue under current pay and conditions

- Tackling safety through WHS rights at Virgin Australia.

## Road Committees for 2026 Fight: Retails and Majors

**TWU Road Delegates** discussed their strategies for the 2026 fight. They spoke about:

- Their key wins in Majors improving EA conditions at StarTrack, securing Productivity Training at Linfox, and aligning FedEx EA to the 2026 fight.
- Targeting the biggest Retail yards first to build union density and structures.
- Mapping expiry dates across Retail targets to align bargaining and build coordinated power.
- Building member-led structures by winning stronger delegate rights.

## TWU MEMBERS PREPARE 'FUTURE OF WORK CLAIM' - FOR DECENT TRANSPORT JOBS INTO THE FUTURE

TWU Assistant National Secretary **Emily McMillan** presented the Future of Work Claim and held discussions with Senator **Tony Sheldon** (and former TWU National Secretary) and **Paul Walsh**, CEO of Industry Skills Australia on:

- The urgent need of transport workers to be put first when it comes to changes in AI and automation.
- The importance of consultation with transport workers as the first step.


